

CONDITIONS FOR SUBMISSION

Participants wishing to present an abstract or be considered for an oral "Hot Topics" presentation, should complete the enclosed "Abstract Form." Abstracts must be in English and if accepted, will be reproduced exactly as typed in the Program to be distributed at the Congress. Abstracts must be received no later than March 1, 1999. Abstracts will not be considered without receipt of completed Congress registration and payment.

CONTENT

The abstract should include:

- A brief title describing the nature of the work
- Names and affiliations of all authors
- A short description concerning the purpose of the study
- A brief description of the methods used
- A summary of the results in sufficient detail to enable review and classification of the abstract
- A conclusion based on the results as they appear in the abstract

The abstract may include line or bar figures in black ink and/or short tables.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR PREPARING AN ABSTRACT

Abstracts for the 6th International Pituitary Congress should be typed with a density of 12 characters per inch, single spaced, within a rectangular frame of 7¼ inches (185mm) x 4¾ inches (120mm).

- Leave <u>no</u> margin at the top or left side. The abstract <u>should not</u> be centered even if it is short.
- The title is to by typed entirely in CAPITAL LETTERS and must not be indented.
- Type the name of each author immediately below the title; do not leave a blank line. For each author, use the initial of the given name followed by the surname, e.g. R. Smith (do not include a middle initial or degree.)

 On the next line, provide the academic or hospital affiliation of each author. For authors from more than one institution, reference the name and the affiliation with a numerical superscript, e.g. R. Smith¹, D. Jones²; ABC Medical Center¹, The Center for Research².
- Leave a single blank line between the affiliations and the beginning of the text.
- Abstracts will not be considered without receipt of Congress registration and payment.

HARD COPY SUBMISSION

Camera-ready abstracts must be submitted on the form provided to be considered for presentation (you may print your abstract on plain paper and paste it on the form, staying within the borders). Authors must submit the original abstract, plus one copy, with a self-addressed envelope, fax number or e-mail address (for notification of acceptance) by March 1, 1999. Do not erase or smudge the abstract. Do not fold the abstract; mail it flat and protected by a sheet of cardboard in a flat envelope.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR A POSTER PRESENTATION

Posters should be prepared in advance, should strictly adhere to the submitted abstract, and should be brought in person by the participants.

Do not mail your poster.

The dimensions of the poster board are 8 feet wide and 4 feet high. Posters should be legible from a distance of 3 feet. Therefore, the title of your poster (the same as that of the abstract) should use letters at least 1" high. The names of the author(s), institution, city, state, and country should be clearly indicated. It is advisable to organize your poster in sections: introduction, methods, results and conclusions. The use of color is recommended. Material for assembling posters (push pins/thumbtacks) will be provided.
